The busy season is upon us. As you will see from our calendar in this issue there will be an abundance of accordion related events happening very soon. The Cotati Accordion Festival and our annual picnic are going to be exciting this year. And we will again make our presence known through participation in the big Making Waves event in San Francisco on Sat. June 21. Last year this event saw 25 stages set up the length of Market Street with 1200 musicians and around 70,000 people in attendance. If you are into folk music the big news is the grand opening of the Lark in the Morning

store at San Francisco's Fisherman's Wharf May 17th and 18th. The BAAC will take to the stage on the 18th from noon to 1:00pm. Both of the days will see some of the finest folk musicians you have every heard playing an assortment of instruments...some of which you probably didn't know existed!

While all of these events are fun and exciting, there is as always a real need for people to assist in the various activities. Already Herb Meier is hard at work on the Cotati Accordion Festival plans and Lou Soper is planning the annual picnic. Both would love to hear from you if you can give them a hand.

The new club bylaws, approved at the last membership meeting, will give a much needed change in the structure of the club. In particular, the financial year and officers' terms will allow for a more reasonable change of the guard. The old system meant changing of officers in the middle of the most busy part of the year's activities which caused major problems.

We are also looking forward to the return of board member Bob Smith from Minnesota where he is attending a month long accordion repair and maintenance school. That sounds like an interesting way to spend your vacation!

BYLAWS CHANGES ACCEPTED

The members attending BAAC's April General Meeting voted 48 - 8 in favor of the changes to our bylaws proposed in the March newsletter. These changes go into effect immediately.

A few voices were heard from at the meeting objecting, not to any specific change, but rather to the idea that the vote was all-or-nothing. One member voiced unhappiness with the fact that the membership is not asked to approve expenditures. While his concern is worthy of discussion, the conclusion of such a discussion would not belong in bylaws, which provide only a general structural guide, but rather would be part of Board procedural rules.

Here are some of the main changes which you will notice:

- Greater emphasis on our non-profit status and the promotion of the accordion outside ourselves which this requires.
- Dues will not be payable until October 1st, since the fiscal year is now 10/1 to 9/30.
- For the same reasons, nominations will be held in August and our election in September, instead of May and June.

• Since the term of office is now two years rather than one, the annual election should always be for only half the total number of BAAC offices. Additionally, one officer and one director-at-large position have been eliminated, leaving a total of eight members of the Board of Directors rather than the previous ten.

• Many more of you will be asked to serve on formal committees, since the bylaws now require the formation of Finance, Program, Promotion, Administration, and Membership committees. MK



Listen to these titles: You Belong To My Heart; Por Fin Toros; There'll Never Be Another You; Paso Doble; and from Evita, I'd Be Suprisingly Good For You. Frank gets so many sound variations from his instrument, it's not hard to understand why he's in demand as a dance band! I especially liked the way he kept the accordion sound throughout the numbers. Hmmm, I always considered myself a reed man, but maybe..... Frank also announced the performance of our Chamber Ensemble on April 20th. Another group we should wholeheartedly support. Thanks Frank!

Next, club recording artist Bob Delgado paid tribute to Charles Magnante with three classic accordion gems: Song Of Naples, Dark Eyes, and Waltz Allegro. Hey, I didn't know you play Allegro that fast! Great stuff. Bob plays with great feeling and his Melodioso is a rich, fine sounding instrument that makes his offerings all the more enjoyable. Bob then accomplished a club first! He played a duet with himself, playing his own arrangement of Pietro Diero's Beautiful Day, a beautiful piece with musette sound. One melody prerecorded and played back on cassette as he played the 2nd part live. This piece was so melodic and beautiful that I turned around fully expecting to see Ed Massolo, our resident dance master and his wife Isabel, come dancing down the center isle! A very pleasing performance. Thank you Bob. What a night, and much more to come!

Just before break Marian did the honors by introducing two unexpected guests. Claudio Vena of the famed Quartetto Gelatto, who had performed the previous two days at Herbst Theater in the Civic Center and at Villa Montalvo in Saratoga. Quartetto Gelato is a group of

In addition, we were honored to have the great chromatic artist **Peter Soave** with us. **Peter** had been invited by the group Composers, Inc. and would perform an award-winning work for solo accordion the following evening in the Veterans' Building Green Room (see February newsletter). **Peter** let us hear a sample of his soon-to-be-released CD played on a borrowed boom box.

Now, back to music. First up in the second half of the program, **Don Nurisso** with his big chords and friend **Lloyd Hermans** with the mellowest of clarinets (from the Calgary Symphony), treated us to a variety of selections. *Stranger On The Shore*, (can you hear that mellow clarinet?), *Everything I Have Is Yours* combined with *The Eyes Of Love*, done in bolero tempo, and finishing with *Weaver Of Dreams*. The neat thing about these two artists is the way their adlibbing styles play off one another creating a tapestry of interwoven riffs, melodies and chords without rhythm backup! Great sounds and technique. Boy are we getting a musical education to-



night, and our next artist drove the mood to yet a n o t h e r "high".

Bart Benico, whom we've missed seeing rec e n t l y , brought his two Giuliettis on stage and

with his parents John and Mary Benico cheering him on from the audience, wowed us with his expertise! Bart apologized at the start for being rusty. My only thought was, "Oh if only I could achieve such a level of rustiness!" Bart wafted through The Breeze And I from Andalucia Suite, and then had us humming along with the very beautiful Gittara Romano. Then, for his feature presentation Bart strapped on another beautiful Giulietti, a gift from his parents when he was a young budding artist, to play the challenging number, The Peanut Vendor. It's not just that Bart plays these pieces flawlessly and with such "gusto", but watching him enjoy his music so much as he plays really adds to the musical enjoyment of the audience. Not unexpectedly an encore was asked for and Bart graciously responded with a fine rendition of Joplin's A Strenuous Life. A great performance. Our thanks to his parents Mary and John for giving the accordion community such a great representative!

And now on to the final performer of the evening. Ken Chambers was with us last year with a stellar performance complete with printed program, and earlier this year came out of the audience cold to play a duet with famed chromatic artist Viekko Ahvenainen. Is there anyone out there that can deny that this former California State Accordion champion is aptly described as "World Class"? And he is Ours! Tonight Ken played for us his arrangement of the entire works of Gershwin's Rhapsody In Blue. A piece 15 or so minutes in length that opened and closed with an incredible note bending sound which emulated the clarinet traditionally used in the orchestration. I can't really describe in words the quality of this performance. As a hushed audience watched, the Master weaved his way through this ultra complicated piece with perfect bellows control, lightning fast keyboard length arpeggios, octave melodies, fast switching, thunderous bellow shakes and dynamic control that errupted near the end in a of grand chorus that just gave us "shivers". All I can say is that you had to be there for this was very special. When Ken finished I don't think I've ever seen an audience leap to its feet so quickly to salute with a standing ovation. Ken Chambers is in a league of very few performers and we are so fortunate to have him with us. We need to hear him more often!

And so there you have it. It was a very lovely way to spend an evening in April. Our thanks to all the fine performers who participated. Man do we have something going with our club or what? And now on to May!!!

Holding Your Accordion for Optimum Performance Capability

The accordion, because of its vertical keyboard, requires correct body placement for maximum technical capability. When you are seated, the bottom section of the keyboard *should not be inside your right leg*. This blocks the bottom section of the keyboard at an inward angle forcing the hand position to be twisted.

The photo on a Charles Magnante arrangement provides the best visual example of correct keyboard placement. The keyboard should be parallel with the center line of the body, which will allow a proper angle for the hand position. To accomplish this, the straps should be tightly adjusted preventing the accordion from moving side to side upon reversal of the bellows direction. The keyboard is only a few inches below the chin, black keys directly in line under the chin and vertical with the center line of the body. When the keyboard is correctly aligned, the technical aspects of fingering, such as the crossing of the 4th finger over the thumb from C to Bb can be executed with confidence and accuracy. This positioning is ideal for both standing or sitting and will present a professional confident appearance and performance.

The Texas Accordion Association's Annual Convention opened on March 14th in Plano, Texas (near Dallas) at the Holiday Inn. I believe there were about 100 in attendance and many more at the Saturday night concert.

The two days were filled with Band practice under the direction of Joan Cochran Sommers from the University of Missouri — Kansas City. Joan's energy and humor took a mixed group of players through about four hours of practice and on to the Saturday night concert. We performed such selections as *Marchetriomphale, Grandfather's Clock, Joplin's Ragtime Dance,* von Weber's *Sonatina,* and other numbers.

There were many workshops offered: Joan's sight reading techniques and her <u>Master's Workshops</u> which anyone could watch and learn from; Gordon Kohl presenting <u>Maximizing the Capabilities of Both Keyboards</u>; Dale Wise speaking to <u>Accordion Repair</u> and <u>Surviving Without an Accordion Instructor</u>; and Jane Christison discussing <u>Accordion Presentation Techniques and Operating an Entertainment Business</u>. Larry Jurak held a workshop on <u>Jazz Chords</u>; Jim Wadowick had the <u>Composer's Forum</u>, and Mike Borelli taught us how to <u>Jam</u>. Jim Rommel spoke to <u>Embellishing Techniques</u> and a Composers' Contest was held at noon on Saturday. There was something going on in four different parts of the Country — about six from California.

The Ballroom was packed for the Saturday night Concert which was followed by a performance of Joan's group from the University and several talented individuals. Sunday morning goodbyes were said — friendships had been renewed, the accordion enjoyed by all, vendors packed up their goods, and another Texas Accordion Convention came to a happy end. My personal thanks to all of the folks from Texas who make these two and a half days possible — it was great!! Dear Editor:
