



He is legendary in the accordion world for his command of classical and European music as it pertains to our accordion, (all types of accordions) which include his famed button box camps. He writes, arranges for the Ensemble and ACE accordion orchestras, which he conducts. We could describe Joe as a Benny Goodman with a heart, using a no-nonsense approach to his music, but a gentle(r) one towards his musicians. (Vince Cirelli told me though that he once asked, "hey Joe, do I have to play all the notes?" and ... was met in return with The Gaze). The group commenced serenading us with Czardas, Czardas #2 and a gorgeous arrangement of Claire de Lune, Joe Smiell's artistry! Very, very nice!

Break Time: Time for all to enjoy the "sweet things" we all had been eyeing. (But couldn't touch) My, my what a selection, and we all had our fill along with great fellowship. And what was this? Santa Claus!, with "kisses" for all! (Ask Lou how he managed that one) During the intermission we also enjoyed some fine "organ" playing by Bob Berta. Bob, with his rare Neronde accordion, treated us to a head turning selection of Christmas

Orchestra, chamber ensemble, and symphonic presentations with all the appropriate sounds. It is accomplished by using the various reed combinations in the various sections to give an astounding variety of tones. A deep rich bottom was provided by the bass accordion of Aldo Argenti. And with all of that, add in the music history lesson and anecdotes that Joe provides during the program, and we find ourselves immersed in a very delightful and informative experience. Re: Chopin Prelude. Chopin was asked why this famous prelude was only 16 measures long? "Why, because when it gets to the 16th measure, it's the end!"

So the Accordion Chamber Ensemble showed us why ACE is the premier accordion orchestra in the world with three Christmas potpourris, which meant a grand sing-along for the audience. Then, in introducing Andante Cantabile, (Out Of This World) Joe quipped, "This piece is so Italian that it makes you want to eat something!" Also included was a Polish Christmas Carol in which the group totally surprised us at one point by bursting into song as they played. (It has to be another world first by a Joe Smiell group!) Then Joe took his jacket off and got down to business and presented Suite #6 of The Suite Of Israel. A very intense piece that concluded with the departure of the souls...a mournful ending.

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MULTISENSORY LEARNING AND YOUR ACCORDION

In this issue of the BAAC Newsletter, we begin a two-part series by member Sev Garcia, BM (Music Theory & Composition), MA (Music). Sev is a graduate student of Robert Davine, Lamont School of Music, Colorado. An educator well-known to our club, his most popular seminar being, "How To Conquer Stage Fright".

"Learning can involve more than just visual learning. It also makes use of hearing, touching and the emotions. The emphasis is on learning by some form of experience rather than learning by following instructions." Barry Green, "The Inner Game of Music"

"Each of us has a unique learning style. We learn best when we learn in a way that suits our style." Stephanie Judy, "Making Music for the Joy of it"

"Nobody ever became a great musician by reading a book. All great musicians got that way by listening to music, playing music, and talking music with fellow musicians." James Galway, flute

We learn so much more when we learn through our SENSES and our EXPERI-ENCE. I'll walk you through some ideas of the three senses most often used in learning to play our accordions. (auditory, visual, and tactile) It will be a smorgasbord of ideas; so take only what you can digest and the rest will be there when you are ready to come back for it. Many of you, I am sure, already use some or all of these techniques. I hope by cataloging them for you, it will make it easier of you to use them.

"The greatest respect an artist can pay to music is to give it life." Pablo Casals, cellist <u>SOUND</u> (auditory)

The aural process cannot be replaced. This is how you learned to speak as a child.

MUSIC is a language. No amount of academic learning can replace HEARING how its practitioners speak the language. LISTEN to musicians to study their solos - note for note. First vocally (singing-humming-whistling them) then playing them on your accordion - not to imitate them but to LEARN: how they hear, how they phrase, how they interpret, how they thread from chord change to chord change and to reinforce auditory memory and to get a sense of rhythmic and melodic possibilities.

What do we achieve through SOUND? We draw attention to and identify mistakes and missed notes. We can listen to the many layers of sound...the combinations of reed sounds you are using.

Andre Watts sings as he plays and so did Glenn Gould. Keith Jarrett and B.B. King groan in sympathy with the music. So did Errol Garner. SING the notes in your head as you play. SINGING is our natural, inborn instrument. We don't have to think of all the technical & theoretical aspects of the music. We are relying on the AUDITORY (hearing) and KINESTHETIC (feeling/touching) senses. Just like singing in the shower.

NOTICE the difference between the sound of your singing, humming, whistling and your playing. NOTICE the sound produced by your thumb and the sound produced by tinue sending you newsletters, between the other fingers. Be aware, focus, and concentrate on the full-round sound of your accordion ONLY. Accept distractions as part of how the human mind works naturally and then "immediately" re-focus on (come back to) the musical sound again.

SINGING, HUMMING, & WHISTLING (softly) are excellent techniques to stay focused and concentrated in order to keep out the negative destructive thoughts that produce stage fright. I'm partial to "soft-whistling" because you must breathe like a woodwind of brass player would breathe.

This gives your musical phrases life, drama and excitement. Your music "sings." See Bob Berta's article, "Make Your Accordion Sing" - BAAC Newsletter, May 1999.

NOTICE the differences between the dynamics (loud/soft) of the sounds you are producing. (i.e. mezzo-piano vs. Fortissimo). NOTICE the specific notes that may be out bers will still pay \$2.00, but non-of tune. Become or create the sound of a metronome in your "inner ear." ART VAN DARN IT ALL

How many of us remember back to the 1950's when at that time KSFO's premiere disk jockey Don Sherwood played Art Van Damme records on a regular basis. The title of this article is the way Don always introduced Art and his music. Art was very popular, and one has to marvel at the strength of this legendary artist's music in the music scene. Not only was he a hit on the pop music stations, but the jazz stations were spinning his disks as well! His style, a sort of cocktail jazz, embraced a melody of moving chords which he combined with an incredibly beautiful ad lib solo. So unique was the quintet sound, (chord melody combined with guitar and vibes lead) that the sound was adapted around 1948 by another legendary performer George Shearing, who formed a similar combination using piano, called the George Shearing Quintet.

Many of us remember Art's music from our youth, listening to his records, and trying to copy his marvelous runs and phrasings. (If only I could slow the record down!) Mike Zampicini (teacher & performer) was able to study Art's published works, as did Paul Henning (The Accordion Broker). And who were the lucky ones who experienced Art's performance at the Presidio sponsored by our BAAC in the early 90's? Not me, and very few that I've talked to. So when Art decided to come to San Jose to the Garden City Casino for two concerts, (at the urging of Prez Lou Soper) the stage was set for a very memorable moment in history. I wasn't going to miss it, and a lot of Art Van Damme fans marked their calendars. The place was packed. The setting, a lovely alpine style dining room with soaring roof line, and a floor to ceiling copper hood fireplace complete with a cozy fire burning. A very romantic setting, perfect for the Van Damme sound. Art appeared with a quartet on this occasion, (minus the vibes). I was kind of disappointed until they started to play and I realized that the guitar lead is the predominant sound in the mix anyway.

"You Stepped Out Of a Dream", and away we went. The sound swept through the room enveloping us all, a magical experience. "Don't Get Around Much", "Satin Doll", out they came one after another 15 or so songs from his recordings along with others gems. "Green Dolphin Street", featuring guitarist Rick Vandivier, who was obviously enjoying his work throughout the session by the smile on his face and his seeming intense study of The Man. "That Old Feeling" featured bassist Seward



McKain, who surprised Art, I think with his imaginative use of fours. Vince Lateano held down the fort on drums. Blazing speed was the order of the day on "All The Things You Are" and "Lonesome Road." And, "Bye Bye Blackbird" treated us to an all out jam between Art and guitar on the last chorus!. It was like stepping back in time to some great memories of accordion playing days as the strains my favorite, "Laura" wafted through the room.

Now, Art is now 79 years young, and he sure doesn't look it. His ability to crank it out is still there only better! The question is not how great Art Van Damme is, but what will be his rightful place in history? Would you agree that he is the greatest swing jazz musician of our time and will probably never be equaled? His music has shaped the way we accordionists think and play, his techniques shaping the way we play whether we realize it or not. He's given our accordion world something it has sorely needed ... an identity! What would it be like without his music and influence? Mike Zampicini stated it perfectly. "Every so often a musician comes along to dominate a particular field by playing beyond his instrument. Stan Getz tenor sax, Paul Desmond on alto, Ella Fitzgerald, and Art Van Damme. The dream of this night ended all too soon!

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
