Walshe Guide Provides Insight into Accordion and Harmonica Events Worldwide

Walshe Essential Guide to Accordion and Harmonica Events: Festivals and Competitions Worldwide, by former BAAC member Willoughby Walshe, now residing in Europe. The November meeting began with chat about the outstanding float and music provided by the BAAC Fun Band during the San Francisco Italian Heritage Day Parade. The float proved to be a crowd favorite, and we hope that the Fun Band will participate again in 2003. While the actual event was spectacular and the crowd was extra appreciative, we were a little upset at the TV coverage: just as our float was coming on screen they elected to cut to an advertisement. When coverage resumed, there was the Loni Anderson float which was just behind our float. Can you imagine choosing to show Loni Anderson over accordion players?? Val announced that Gordon Piatanesi was selected by the BAAC board for a special honorary membership in BAAC. Gordon is the past owner of Colombo Accordions, and a major figure in the history of the accordion in San Francisco. We are hoping to get Gordon to attend a meeting to "officially" accept the honorary membership.

Impromptu pre-meeting, intermission, and end-of-theevening music was provided by Rino Pucci, Rusty Bartoli, Reno Di Bono, Harry Gay, John Marquette, Jim Hillman, Peter Di Bono and Lou Soper.

Starting the music part of the meeting, two of the three BAAC Scholarship winners were featured. Salane Schultz (student of Lou Soper) and Thor Miao (student of Lou Jacklich) were present to accept their awards—but they didn't get those awards without a "demonstration" of their musical prowess. (The third Scholarship was awarded to Peter Di Bono's student Julia Farrugia, who could not come to this meetingbut we will hear from her in the future!)

First up was Salane playing Indifférence, Give My Regards To Broadway (with a great bit of singing too), and Carnival of Venice. Teacher Lou Soper then joined Salane in a lively duet of The Down Home Rag. The audience was astounded to learn that she has been playing for only five months. Wow...what a fast learner! She exhibited very fine playing along with a delightful stage presence. We will be looking forward to return visits.

Thor Miao was next up, and while we have heard him a couple of times before, it became very evident that he is progressing rapidly. He chose a very ambitious program which included a Finnish Polka, Hungarian Dance # 6, and Flight of the Bumblebee. I and others were surprised at the choice of the last two numbers which are very difficult to perform, but Thor played them with aplomb and kept those "bees" flying in

The intermission was next and offered a wonderful opportunity to partake of yet another delicious repast prepared by Frances and Domenic Benedetto. How do they do it? Next, past BAAC President Frank Montoro performed

some very nice arrangements of well-known tunes. Frank started with *Cry Me a River*, a lovely, sultry cabaret song I always enjoy listening to, and Frank did a particularly moving rendition of it. He then took us on a trip to the bull ring with *La Virgen de la Macarena*. This is a traditional tune that the matadors use to implore the Blessed Virgin to protect them from the bull. He then proceeded to play a medley of French tunes starting with *Song from Moulin Rouge* (one of my favorite tunes by the way), *Hymne à l'Amour* and the theme song from the musical *Gigi*. As a lover of stage and movie music, I was delighted with Frank's fine performance which showed lots of emotion and demonstrated an artistic and sensual interpretation of the music played.

The featured event of the night was a special performance and story telling by Vince Cirelli. Vince enthralled us as his conversation covered the early history of the accordion in San Francisco sprinkled with various tips on how to "wear" your accordion, how to take care of it, and of course how to play it. He used his Petosa Millennium Reedless Accordion to demonstrate a wide variety of musical interpretations utilizing creative arrangements aided by a selection of different sounds that the electronic accordion could apply to the music to complement the tune. As a human store house of a huge amount of accordion history, Vince is truly a treasure that the BAAC club can be proud of, and of course his ability to repair and rebuild accordions is legendary. Heck, he is also one fine accordionist to boot!







The Emotional Component of Music Practice By Bob Barnes

Reprinted with permission from the newsletter of the Tualatin Valley Accordionists (very slightly edited) I want to make clear that the opinions expressed are only mine and may in no way be attributed to my valued friends.

People are complex and no more so than when they are making the decision about whether or not to spend precious time practicing on their instrument. Further decisions will follow about what they want to accomplish in their practice time and how they will go about doing it. The strength of their decisions will determine how disciplined they will be during the practice time. The ensemble practice at the end of our last meeting caused me to reflect on this. If you were there, you will recall how long and hard Doris (Osgood) worked us in learning how to play the music. There is a lesson there for all of us.

For five years in the middle of the 1990s, I was heavily involved in preparing for and playing in the competitions at Kimberley and Leavenworth. I played in both the solo and duet categories at the time. Each one required the performance of three pieces. I practiced very hard all year on those six pieces. The majority of my practice time was spent in perfecting those six numbers. It was a high-intensity life, this accordion playing — even stressful. At the end of four years of this, I made the ultimate decision about practice. I put the instrument away and didn't touch it for 8 months. When I picked it up and started to play again, I was so conditioned to competitive practicing that I once again began preparing to compete and did so again. The goals for competing were met once again, but the stress was more than I would endure any longer.

After that I made another major decision about practicing. I put the instrument away for 3 years and began learning to play the button box. The Joe Smiell camps were wonderful. They rejuvenated my spirit, taught me some wonderful new things about music and gave me a whole new set of friends.

I have picked up the piano accordion again and have begun to become reacquainted with it. But I have thought a lot about why I practice in the first place and what I really want

to accomplish. It is a lot of hard work. It takes valuable time away from important matters. If Irene (author's wife) hadn't taken up the instrument to play with me, it would have meant taking a lot more time away from her. May I share a few thoughts with you on these issues ...

It is important to have someone to play for. It may be only for someone close to you, but sharing our music is a major reason for me to practice properly. When large accordion studios were in business, they immediately recognized that performance is a key element in the training of a musician. If all you are going to do is play for yourself at home, there is not much motivation to work hard at practice. So, while I do not actively plan to compete any longer, we do have opportunities now and then to play for others. It is important to us to play well when those chances come. So, we choose numbers within our level of ability and practice to play them as tastefully as that ability will allow.

The motivation is great to play music that you personally enjoy. Select pieces that you like. Be sure that you like them as well on the accordion as you do when they are performed by that large orchestra you heard play it on the CD. The accordion is a versatile instrument, but it cannot duplicate the efforts of 25 or more instrumentalists.

Recognize that practice time is generally not a time to be performing. You need to isolate passages that you do not play up to your standards and work, work, work on them. I find that even after I have slowly worked through the parts that I do poorly, I can continue to play the whole piece slowly enough to be accurate, and quickly bring it up to speed when a performance is imminent. Did you notice how Doris had us play a few measures slowly over and over again? That reflects the wisdom of a good teacher. She focused on small details, on correct phrasing, and repeatedly took us through it ever so slowly. The speed will come easily after the fingering and bellows techniques are carefully worked out.

Play some numbers that are a change of pace now and then. Some old numbers that are easy for you to play are always fun. Some new music that is at or below your ability level is refreshing to play. Then try some new music that is difficult and regularly work on a few measures at a time—slowly. Treat this as an exercise and enjoy a lovely tune while you work on your technique. Keep a pencil handy to write in fingering, dynamics and other things that are important to you. If it is really difficult, forget the basses for a while and just play the top note of each chord. When you get around to the basses, write in the fingering and the counter-basses and just play those for a while.
