Cordoni was up next. As most of you know, Tom is the organizer of the great annual Petaluma Accordion Celebration, which took place June 24 (our SF Accordion Band was among the players). Today Tom played a variety of tunes, beginning with a Spanish set, Morena di mi

Coplas and El Gato Montes. Then, after playing the familiar Charade, Tom launched into a German

series: Edelweiss, Lili Marlene and The Happy Wanderer ("Valderi-Valdera"). Then he moved on to France with a lovely set of French waltzes. I wasn't familiar with Piove, Guaglione and Marina but believe that was an Italian set. Tom finished with a little whimsy: Yo-Ho, Yo-Ho; Bibbidy Bobbidy Boo, Mickey Mouse March, and It's a Small World.

Next came The Eurotones, very familiar to me and many others. The group consists of **Kay and Tom** Newburg on button box and **Harry Cannata** on amplified guitar. Kay sings the vocals, sometimes in Slovenian. sometimes in Ger-


man, as well as English,

she has a wonderful voice. And—you couldn't hope to meet nicer people. Except for the well-known Oh How He lied, I wasn't able to write down the other beautiful pieces they played.

After an intermission that featured a lot of great food (and a lot of hard work by volunteers), the music continued with Bart Beninco, who had his beautiful mom, Mary, with him. Bart is one of the smoothest. most exquisite players one could ever hope to hear. Bart started out playing his Sonola accordion, with A Media Luz (tango); Andalucia (The Breeze and I); Pietro Frosini's Autumn Breezes, composed for accordion and containing some awesome bass melodies; Dark Eyes with variations, that included two melodies in the right hand simultaneously! Wow!! Bart related how he

used to play Italian music with his dad, so he played a few. One was Tre Veglia e Sono (Retuning Dreams). Then he played a tango that is one of his specialties: Chitarra Romana, followed by Non Scordar Di Me (Don't Forget Me, that Pavarotti often sang at the end of his concerts). Bart continued with Henry

Mancini's Baby Elephant Walk with a repeating bass pattern and a surprise ending on a very high note. Bart's last piece on the Sonola accordion was The Peanut Vendor (Brazilian) with a Latin bass pattern, expertly executed as always. Then Bart switched to his Giulietti accordion for his pièce de résistance, Schubert's Ave Maria. The audience,

already in a party mood, fell so silent you could have heard a pin drop. I'm sure there wasn't a dry eye in the house. It was the most moving rendition of the famous *Ave Maria* that I have ever heard. The applause afterward was deafening—and well deserved!

The rest of the afternoon featured the great Steve Balich himself

with his polka band, including son Steve Jr. (also on accordion) and **Tom Casazza** (drums and vocal). Before I had to leave (I hear the fun went on for hours longer). I heard at least these songs: El Rio Drive Polka; Bionda Biondina (Everyone

Lied. By now there were quite a number of dancers out on the floor and even outside on the deck! (Pres. Peter Di Bono introduced here a great dancer who happens to be 93 years old: Millie Wait!!) The Balich Band continued with the Slovenian Daj Daj and Schneewalzer (Snow Waltz); Spanish Eyes/Yours Till the End of Life's Story/Solamente Una Vez (You Belong to My Heart); I don't Know Why I Love You Like I Do/Nevertheless/I Left My Heart in San Francisco; Il Bersaglieri Polka, La Paloma, a Mexican Waltz, Your Cheatin' Heart/Hey Good Lookin'; Have I told You Lately That I Love You . . . And on and on. The audience couldn't get enough, and I had to leave for another obligation or I would have stayed there till the very end.

We of the SF Accordion Club thank you, **Steve and Jennie Balich**, for organizing a terrific show for our club, and for bringing down with you many, many members of the Accordion Club of the Redwoods—showing not only what a following you have, but also showing warm support between our clubs. I hope we can reciprocate for your club, and that we can do this exchange quite regularly. *Val*




### Our Special Thanks . . .





# The Las Vegas International Accordion Convention


