May Meeting: Ladies' Night

May is our traditional Ladies' Night month, and this surely was one of our best. Lynn Ewing, always willing to help out, was our MC for the evening, since our usual MC and President, Peter Di Bono, missed most of the meeting because of a playing job (I think he has more playing jobs than any one person I know!).

In our audience that evening were **Lou and Mary Soper**, faithful members who have had a lot of problems so that we haven't seen as much of them lately, and their helpers Bryan and Carol. Among visitors at the meeting were several Moose members who admire accordion music, and **Joe Zajak**, President of the Medford Accordion Club in Oregon.

First up on the musical program was yours truly (Val, who was not as prepared as she'd like to be), playing *Plaisir d'Amour*, *Vienna*, *My City of Dreams*, and *It Might As Well Be Spring*.

Next came Norma Parsons (accordion) and Tyane Boye (violin), known as "Buttons & Bow."

I've heard these two very talented ladies down at the Silicon Valley Accordion Society, and they are fabulous! They play a wonderful mix of pieces, including (but not limited to)



the good oldies "Buttons & Bow" Norma and Tyane that we all know and love, interpreted in a new and beautiful way. Tyane is so into the music that she dances while playing her violin! They treated us to Beautiful Days (a gorgeous waltz, familiar to many of us), Orchids in the Moonlight, Japanese Sandman (from the 20's), Italian Street Song by Victor Herbert, Singing In the Rain (with mixed rhythms, including a segment in waltz time), and Pennies From Heaven, with a terrific run at the end of the piece. In between musical acts the club made a presentation of a special certificate to **Clyde Forsman**, making him an honorary lifetime member of the SFAC, in recognition and appreciation of his long history of promoting the accordion and its beauty and versatility. Among the club's most beloved, and always-

willing, performers are Jackie Jones and **Pauline Schulten.** This evening they were cowgirls (Pauline was even wearing some slick looking brown and white chaps!) and played a super program of old Western music, including some great vocals sung by Pauline. They played (and sang) Cotton-Pickin' Time (which

From Seattle, WA came our featured star performer **Bonnie Birch** and her guitarist **Nick Heiting** and her bass player, **Juan Barco**. (We decided to allow these two gentlemen play for Ladies' night!) Wow! What a program! Although very thoroughly rehearsed, these people all play seemingly effortlessly. These are real pros and present themselves in a really classy manner. Bonnie gave us a little history of the group, and we learned that Bonnie (like so many of us) had hung up her accordion for about 25 years and then got it out and took up playing again. Bonnie and Nick have played together for 8 1/2 years, and Juan joined them 3 years ago. Nick and Bonnie met through a mutual *(Continued on next page)* musician friend from their contacts with the local Festa Italiana. The group has a very versatile repertoire and played many different styles of music for us.

I was unable to get all the names in my notes, but Bonnie kindly wrote out the names of the songs on a sheet for me. If I can read her writing correctly, the pieces were (or at least included): March of the Toys by Victor Herbert (1903); Pobre Flor (fast Argentine "Tango waltz"), Apache (a concoction of theirs that includes Ghost Riders In The Sky), a Swiss Landler & Swiss fox trot (Nick sang in German and whistled); In Der Schweiz which included a vodel by Nick; Atotonilco (Tex Mex Polka including vocal by Juan); La Danza tarantella by Rossini (Galla-Rini arrangement); One-Note Samba/Night & Day (Cole Porter, and included a lovely vocal by Nick), arranged by Bonnie; Take The A Train (Big Band piece well known by most of us); Vanessa (Bernie Wayne); an arrangement (or "concoction" as Bonnie calls it) that included a chord progression all the way to the bottom end of the 120-bass accordion; "Stairway to Mozart," consisting of both Stairway to Heaven and Mozart's Turkish March; and a Mexican polka called Jesusita en Chihuahua. Wow! I hope this group comes around more often. They're 4 terrific! And I was fortunate to have Bonnie and Nick as my houseguests! Bonnie is a longtime friend from the days when the Galla-Rini camp was



Report from Bob Berta in Michigan . . .

RE: His New Home

It has been a great pleasure getting our new house all in order and customizing it.... Weather has been very wet and unseasonal for here. April was the driest one on record but May made up for it with the fifth wettest May in history here. Still not much rain compared to back in SF, but when it comes through it comes through dramatically with torrential downpour for about 15 minutes, big lightning and thunder and then nice again.... Very different weather than we Californians are used to. It's nice to be able to go out at 10:30 at night and still have comfy 70's temperature. Nice to sit out on the deck and visit or star gaze.

Re: Michigan Accordion Society

I attended my first Michigan Accordion Society meeting last night (this was written on May 19-Ed.) The club has about 170 members. Fifty were in attendance, and they said that was a bit less than normal. The meetings were somewhat similar to ours. After the business portion they would have a few members play in short sets, 3 tunes or so. I played and evidently was OK as they asked me to play a few more. They have some VERY good players in the club. I was expecting a lot of ethnic music but they had a pretty varied play list. They had a strong contingent of jazz players that were excellent. You and other SF Club members may have heard Tony Dannon play before. He is their VP and a fabulous jazz accordionist. I didn't catch the names of all the better players, but as I mingle more I hope to get a bit more familiar with them. There were a few MIDI players in the club. One of them lives only a mile from me, and we are going to get together to jam and fiddle with the MIDI stuff. One of the members asked me if I knew Lou Soper.

They have a concert by Alexander Poeluev in July. He is evidently a very high-quality concert bayanist on tour. They are also working with a college in Detroit that is putting on a four-day accordion workshop August 15-18! It will have some concerts as well as workshops by some notables. They have confirmed attendance for Frank Marocco and Stas Venglevski, so it may be a very nice event. As I get more info on this I will let you know in case any SFAC members want to include it in their summer vacation plans. And if they do, they can stay at my house—I have lots of room for guests.

My new Vignoni/Fisart was quite the attraction. The audience was very impressed with the sound, and after the meeting Tony Dannon and about four other top players asked if they could try it out. They took turns playing it for an hour and a half!

RE: Thoughts on the SFAC

I can't think of anything I have participated in the last few years that was a memorable or as much fun for me. Of course the friendship of all those fellow accordionists is wonderful—nothing like a bunch of people with the same interests to make life interesting—but there is a lot more I got out of the club over the years. First and foremost is the challenge of becoming a better musician, the opportunity to play for the club, and participating in the WONDERFUL accordion ensembles under Joe Smiell's leadership. 

DIRECTIONS TO NATURE FRIENDS PARK 3115 Butters Drive, Oakland

From San Francisco or Northern Peninsula, take the Bay Bridge. While on the bridge, get into the second lane from the right, to make sure that you end up on the correct freeway, which is 580 east (toward Hayward). Once you are on 580, very soon you will see the exit for 24/Walnut Creek. Take that exit. From 24, take the exit "Highway 13 South/Hayward." (It is the next exit after Broadway.) From 13, take the exit "Joaquin Miller Road." (You will also see the Mormon Temple and signs "Chabot Space & Science Center.") Two left turns in quick succession will put you on Joaquin Miller Road. Butters Drive is the second right turn off Joaquin Miller Road (after Hedge Lane). The road twists and turns for a while, and then you will see Nature Friends on the right. It will be marked for the BAAC picnic.

From central Peninsula, take the San Mateo Bridge. Continue straight through Hayward (this will automatically be Jackson Street). Stay in the middle lane. At a large bank of signals you will automatically be in the correct lane as the road bends left and becomes Foothill Blvd. Stay in that middle lane, which will take you onto 580 West toward Oakland. After about 10 miles you'll see the exit for Highway 13 North/Berkeley (immediately after Seminary Ave. exit). Take 13 north to Joaquin Miller Road exit; go right onto Joaquin Miller and proceed as above.

From South Bay: Take Dumbarton Bridge. From the bridge, go north on 880; take the Jackson Street exit, go right onto Jackson and proceed as indicated above under "Central Peninsula." There are other ways but this is the simplest.

From Marin County: Take the Richmond Bridge. Continue until freeway merges with highway 80 West. Once you're past University Avenue in Berkeley, stay out of the extreme right lanes or you might end up in San Francisco! Also stay out of the far left lane. This way you will easily get onto 580 East. Then proceed as from SF/Northern Peninsula above.

If coming from Contra Costa County, take 24 west and 13 south and proceed to Joaquin Miller Road, etc. as indicated above.
