# Minutes of Business Action Taken at BAAC's March 4th General Meeting by Val Kieser

After a brief discussion of the matter, the following motion was made by the President, Bob Berta, seconded by Glenn McClelland, and passed by a majority show of hands:

...That, in the interest of promoting the accordion in this Year of the Accordion, the Bay Area Accordion Club increase its donation to the American Accordionists' Association by \$400, making BAAC's total donation \$500.

Then, after Frank Montoro outlined for the membership the reasons why the following motion makes sense for the Club, the motion was made and seconded and passed by the required twothirds majority:

... That the Bylaws be amended as follows:

Article VI, Item 2: Term of Office: Delete the sentence "No officer shall serve more than two successive years."

Article VIII: Delete "No Director shall serve more than two (2) consecutive years."

The reasons given have to do with the need to keep good and willing talent on the Board for more than two years, to maintain continuity. At a later date, a system of rotation of officers/board members might be considered.

After another brief discussion led by Frank Montoro, a motion was made and seconded and passed by the required two-thirds majority:

... That the Bylaws be amended as follows:

Article IX, Nominations and Elections: Item#2: Change "April" to "May"; Item #3, Change "May" to "June"

Reasons have to do with eliminating the unnecessary extra month between May election and July 1 installation of officers and directors.

While they played a lot of Alpine music, they really were "international" in ethnic origin and selections. The accordionist Bob Maggiora was (appropriately for BAAC) Italian; the guitar player Steve McGinnis, Celtic; the horn player Jan Meers, definitely Dutch; and the drummer Portor Goltz, Germanic. (I knew there had to be a German in there somewhere!) Varied song selections included Spanish, Italian, French, German, and traditional American numbers. The horn player, Jan Meer, played at least three different instruments during the show, and none of them was his primary instrument — piano and keyboard.

The best part about the performance (I thought) was that the audience was drawn into the music from the first note. You felt a part of every song played. After a long

# Accordionizing on The Love Boat by Gene Lovello

BAAC member Gene Lovello is (Interested???) spreading the accordion gospel throughout the South Pacific as he fulfills a six month contract aboard the cruise ship Golden Princess. After visiting Australia, New Zealand, Bali, China, Korea, Russia and Japan, his tour will end in British Columbia in May. Gene reports the following anecdotes - somewhat abridged (with apologies) to fit the newsletter.

"I was playing the Sicilian Tarantella at dinner when a woman looked up and asked if I would play 'something Italian.' I switched to Sorrento when two minutes later another woman asked the same question. At that point I began playing the Beer Barrel Polka and all the questions ended."

"An eleven year old girl laid five song requests on me in a row that I have never heard of. I now avoid 11 year olds .... Polkas being the most popular music, I was stopped one evening by a lady at the dinner table, who asked that I not play the Too Fat Polka."

"Another passenger seated at the table was a balding male with a few wisps of flying hair on back. He kept scowling over his shoulder until I asked him what was wrong. His reply was 'I don't want to get my hair caught in that darned thing."

Gene relates that:

- He most enjoys meeting the passengers, who are mostly American with many from the Bay Area.

-The most difficult aspect of playing aboard ship is strolling under high seas conditions. At times the 600' ship has lifted its propellers out of the water due to pitching.

-His biggest concerns are busy waiters with their hands full and passengers standing too close with drinks in their hands.

- His contract is for six months, but others run from two to ten months.

- A frequent question is, "How do you know which button to push?" Gene's usual reply, "Lucky, I guess."

Further anecdotes include:

"A Catholic priest with a French accent hailed me one evening and asked me to play As Time Goes By. He explained that he had just seen Casablanca for the first time and was taken by the song of the movie. The man was 71 years old, and as I left, he said 'Play it Again, Gene.'"

"Today while playing the lounge, an older lady approached me, standing before me, she reached out and placed her hand on the bass side of the instrument -I didn't realize she was deaf until she said to me that she had enjoyed watching me play and now she wanted to 'hear' it. Being partially deaf in one ear, I felt great empathy for this sweet and gentle soul who so moved me."

"One evening in the dining room I was stopped by a man seated at the table who requested Let Me Call You Sweetheart. As I began to play he stood up and sang it to his wife. Later I came back and asked him how long they had been married '54 short years' was his reply. Once again, I was moved."

And on the other hand ...

"One evening I heard announced over the PA a singles get-together in the disco lounge at 10 PM. 'Hmmm - why not? I'm single — might meet a nice lady.' So off I went to the Disco where I sat down and ordered a drink. The music was playing and the mirrored ball was slowly throwing spears of light around the room. I sat there for two hours and do you know who turned up? Nobody! Not one person all night. I went to bed."

Sorry Gene....better luck on the next cruise, and thanks for your comments. Many of us have wondered about playing aboard ship, and you answered a lot of questions!

I am writing to say that the enactment of a bylaw amendment doing away with term limits for our Club officers and board members needs to be reconsidered. This issue as originally stated in the bylaws was well discussed before its inclusion. The underlying reason was to insure that new people would continuously come to the leadership of the Club and would bring with them new ideas and attitudes to their elected positions. The idea of limiting terms, it was stated, also guards against the possibility of a person or group of people taking over the Club as their private entity.

At the March meeting I sat in row three from the back, and I could not hear the proposal or discussion concerning the amendment. This is because of the acoustics at Donworth. Bob Berta speaks in a quick, rapid-fire style, and together with the acoustics, I was not able to hear the proceedings.

Article X of our bylaws states that intended amendments "shall be published in the BAAC Page and voted upon by the membes(sic)." This was not done, and maybe the amendments ought to be brought up again anyhow.

The bylaws state that the "purpose" of the Club is to "promote the accordion as a performing instrument, ....introduce the accordion to young children .... " There hasn't been much done lately to further the "purpose" of the Club. I think this is related to the fact that there are currently people in leadership roles who have been there since the Club's inception and, I believe, they ought to move over and let new people with new thoughts and ideas have an opportunity to lead. It seems the only "purpose" has been amassing more money in our general fund. This money, without a plan to accomplish the "purpose" of the Club, is useless. It's like having a silo full of seed for planting, and nobody knows how to plant a crop.

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# Promote the Year of the Accordion

Last year during the Houston-based American Accordionists' Association (AAA) convention, an Accordion Summit Meeting was conducted. The meeting resulted in the development of a marketing campaign to promote the accordion on a national basis. AAA officials were to select various public-oriented accordion-related events to be promoted by a nationally recognized public relations agency. <u>Stephen Koenigsberg (516-264-0640)</u> was selected for this honor.

AAA targeted the New Jersey Accordion Teachers' Association and the Texas Accordion Association's annual convention as the first two public events to be featured for the promotional benefits. Since both events occurred on the same weekend (March 8 - 10), I do not know the results of the NJ event. I do know that the Texas event was well publicized.

<u>Television</u>: Channel 5, one of the leading TV stations in the Dallas/Fort Worth area, came to the convention and filmed several accordionists. We received extensive coverage during the 6 PM news and good coverage at the end of the 10 PM news.

<u>Newspapers:</u> We noted good newspaper coverage in the Fort Worth Star Telegram, the Arlington News, and the Houston Chronicle. If any of you have seen it elsewhere, give us a call.

Radio: Dallas' leading rock station KLUV covered the accordion "big time." On Thursday, we received numerous spot announcements. On Friday morning, Jim Rommel and Mike Borelli (two leading accordionists from the DFW area) went to the station for a live promotion. During the next three hours (6 AM to 9 AM), callers asked for rock numbers, and many asked accordion-related questions. The show resulted in great coverage for the accordion, the convention, and those two performers. We predict that this type of promotion could have cost between \$5,000 and \$10,000. Had it not been for the "Year of the Accordion" promotion, this type of advertising would be financially impossible.

Dallas-area public radio station KERA also gave us great coverage. The information is currently being prepared to be broadcast on the chain of NPR stations.

<u>What can you do?</u> Send money. The national accordion promotion is expensive. AAA officials asked for \$1,000/month for this year and they are still about \$2,000 short of that goal.

# A Wonderful "Find" in San Luis Obispo

About 4 times a year I go to the San Louis Obispo area of California (central Calif.) on business. Specifically it is to the quaint town of Pismo Beach. On my last trip I was told that if I liked great German food I should check out the Old Vienna Restaurant at 1527 Shell Beach Road. My co-worker said he used to live in Germany and it really reminded him of Germany's fine restaurants. With past trips marked by OK but not noteable food I decided to try his recommendation. When I walked in the door I was not only greeted by the sound of an accordion being played, but I also noted about 3 other accordions and button boxes sitting around waiting to be picked up. WOW, this trip was looking better after all! Turns out the owner of the restaurant loves accordion, having come from a family that had an BB accordion-playing father. The owner never learned to play accordion (played piano) but his 14 year old son Seppi plays both PA (really nice 120 bass Da Vinci) and a 2 row Hohner diatonic. He has a lovely younger daughter but I didn't get a chance to find out if she is a musician also. Dad, mom, son and daughter are constantly scooting around waiting tables, playing music, visiting repeat customers and fitting in homework where time allows. It is a real family operation.

Weekends and special events/parties feature adult accordionist Chuck Osborne who played a very nice 126 bass Universal accordion (140 bass with a couple of rows short on the top). Chuck played a little of everything from German to Spanish to jazz including all the popular songs. A spirited group really enjoyed his playing and sang along enthusiastically on just about every song. Besides the seasonal Christmas music, some Jewish tunes, and all the rest, it seemed that that group knew the words to every song written! Young Seppi took the stage for a while and played a selection of German tunes and strolled around the tables like a real pro.

Of course the food was really great. I recommend the chicken breast wrapped in Westphalian Ham. A couple of mugs of Spaten Dark and I found it hard to leave. Once the crowd thinned out I had a chance to talk to papa Reithofer who told me about his love of the accordion and how his dream would be to have an accordion festival there. Unfortunatelly Pismo Beach is kind of a red-neck town so that may not be too likely in the near future.

Anyway if you are ever in that neck of the woods you might want to check out the place. Also you are invited to bring along your accordion to play a couple of tunes. Any music will do....German is not the only music allowed. If you get down there mention my name....I told him that I would try to get some accordionists down for a visit.


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
