Peter then announced that one of our longest-term members, Clyde Forsman, is turning 91 on May 3! There were also other April birthdays to announce, including Gus Greyhosky's. Peter noted that Dominic Palmisano was present at the meeting wearing a sling, as a result of some recent surgery. Bob Smith's book, Fingering for the Accordion, is available at this meeting. Next month (May) we will have our first meeting at our new venue, the Oyster Point Yacht Club. It will be our club's 16th anniversary (Founders' Day) as well as Ladies' Day (performers).

On to the music part of the meeting. We had heard how entertaining Margie and Aldo Bin from San Jose were, and now we know firsthand! Margie strolled seemingly effortlessly with her accordion,



With Aldo singing, together they performed Strangers In the Night. Strolling again, Margie played Tarantella, Twilight Time, Ciribiribin, Third Man Theme. For their finale, after explaining how it applied to them, together they performed The Second Time Around. Well, it isn't hard to understand why this performing couple is so popular! We thank you both, Margie and Aldo, and hope you'll be back again soon.

We have waited many years for John Fiore to play for the


club. I don't know what convinced him to play this time, but we're mighty glad he did! I personally have known Johnny since the mid-60's, but others in the club have known him up to ten years longer than that! I've always been blown away by his playing. More than anyone I know, Johnny can instantly come up with a melody to fit whatever is going on, or something that was said, or any little thing that might suggest a special tune. What an amazing talent!

John was playing his white accordion with the "negative" keys—black keys are white and vice-versa. He made a special tribute to **Shirley Temple Black** for her 78th birthday. He

played bits and snatches of many familiar tunes, including *Rhapsody* in *Blue* and *Beyond the Blue Horizon*. Also little bits of *As Time Goes By* and the *Marseillaise*. My notes say "Adventures in Paradise" but I'm not sure if that was a song John played, or the TV show, or whether it had another context. I can't write as fast as John can play and talk!

He imitated his very early accordion lessons, his "First Waltz" and his "Second Waltz." Later he learned a Mazurka, then a polka (he demonstrated with *La Compagnola*, which he played *very* fast). He played *South of the Border* while pointing out that the lyrics should have said "The Mission bells *tolled* me" instead of "...told me!" He

played bits of Chopin's Minute Waltz, which originally was "Minuet Waltz." By request from someone in the audience he played Cuddle Up a Little Closer." In between stories Johnny played the lovely French La Seine, then the Italian O Sole Mio, the German O Susanna (which bear no resemblance to the Oh Susanna we grew up with), the Swedish Karlstad Ball, and, "from Wyoming," Home on the Range and Don't Fence Me In. We heard bits of La Vie En Rose, I'm Dancing (a cute waltz

from Hello, Dolly), Singin' in the Rain (by request), It Had to Be You, Carolina in the Morning, El Relicario. Then Hail to the Chief as Pres. Peter came up to the stage. Then it was "Happy Birthday to Clyde." John, don't wait another 16 years to play for us!!!

After the drawing for the door prizes, we had intermission, followed by the drawing for the cash prizes.

The music portion of the meeting resumed with the lovely music of George Cerruti as he played Stranger in Paradise intermingled

with Baubles, Bangles and Beads and reverting back to Stranger in Paradise; followed by All of Me, Sweet Georgia Brown, Fascinatin' Rhythm, Girl from Ipanema and, special for Vince Cirelli, These Foolish Things. Then The Touch of Your Hand, Samba de Orpheus (??) and It Had to Be You. I didn't get the titles to all the songs George played, but his playing was a special treat that we do not get to hear often enough! Thanks, George!

The last performance on the program was the precision group of five players, **AbsolutAccord**, led by **Richard Yaus**. The other members



What a performance! Congratulations to all of you and especially to Richard!


A hearty Welcome Back to a returning member, **David Bogdanoff** of Sunnyvale.



ABOUT OUR NEW VENUE, THE OYSTER POINT YACHT CLUB

Several of us have visited the yacht club and been warmly and graciously greeted by Dee and Dave ("Admiral") Bennett. Marina sign at Marina Blvd; turn right on Marina Blvd. which is the next street after Gull Drive. (*Be sure to avoid the "Right Turn Only" lane at Gull Drive*, the street before Marina Blvd.!) Continue on Marina Blvd. After you see a hotel and restaurant on your left, you will pass a guard station in the center of the road. Keep on going straight ahead until you see a sign in front the building indicating "Oyster Point Yacht Club." There is a parking lot in back of the club and lots of parking at the side of the club, close to the entrance stairs and gramp.


OUR CLUB PICNIC

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
