But if you liked lively music with crowd appeal, a smattering of accordion vendors and the atmosphere of San Francisco's Fisherman's Wharf, then the Anchorage Accordion Festival would have brightened your afternoon. And indeed, a number of BAAC members could be seen enjoying themselves on the stage and among the crowd.

There was certainly plenty of Cajun music (which personally appeals to me,) and the featured bands were two which we all recognize - Those Darn Accordions and Jim Boggio & the Sonoma Swamp Dogs. Though missing from Cotati, Jim is alive and well and involved in the planning of a new accordion festival for next year (I'm sure he'll keep us informed.) Strolling musicians who provided music in and around the Center were BAAC members Bob Delgado, Dominic Palmisano and Cindy Tuculet and Gene Lovello, among others. 
The showcase event was the "Main Squeeze" contest which featured several

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Book Review

Accordion Man: The Legendary Dick Contino is a new book available through Petosa Accordions. Bob Bove, one of the book's two authors, first met Dick Contino while on a tour of duty in Korea. Dick and his troupe were entertaining in the Pusan area at Bob Bove's battery's position. The two struck up a relationship which evolved over the years into a friendship.

He and co-author Lou Angellotti move chronologically through Dick's life, from his birth in Fresno, early musical training in San Francisco with Angelo Cognazzo, and his sudden transformation by Horace Heidt into a legend in part one of the book. The second part chronicles the good and bad times of the rest of Dick's life and career up to the present.

Bove explains that he was inspired to write the book to set the record straight on the story of Contino's life. He wants everyone to know of Dick Contino, the man who, in the face of tremendous adversity, righted his life with the assistance of a loving family, a devoted friend, and countless fans.




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Gordon and Gloria Dinner

Sitting around the accordion equivalent of the cracker barrel, listening to the old timers reminisce about the instrument's heyday, I've heard it stated that you could walk into any music store and the accordions would be lined up on the shelves like guitars are today. One might ask one's self, "Where did all these accordions come from?"

Well... at one time there were at least 7 accordion manufacturers here in San Francisco alone, and on Sunday night, October 23, 1994, a large group of accordion players and fans paid tribute to the retirement of the last of these fine companies, Colombo & Sons. Gordon Piatanesi and his lovely wife Gloria were the Guests of Honor at a festive dinner at the El Patio Espanol on Alemany which featured a pleasant meal, accordion music (played on Colombo accordions of course) and appropriate tribute to Gordon and Gloria.

Our Master of Ceremonies, Domenic Saso, did his usual fine job of handling the microphone, but when he got to the history of the company, Gordon couldn't constrain himself from jumping in to assist. Gordon's Grandfather, Colombo, learned the trade in Castelfidardo, Italy (World Capital of Accordion Manufacturing) before immigrating to America in 1907, where he began by buying into and operating the Guerrini Company in San Francisco. In 1927 Colombo and his two sons sold their interest in Guerrini and began the Columbo tinuously until 1994. The Columbo accordion quickly became one of the most respected in the field, and the quality and service offered by three generations of Piatanesis allowed the company to out last all of the then robust competitors in the area. Those interested can find further details in the Golden Age of the Accordion, which also included an interesting section on Gordon's Great Uncles who were involved in accordion manufacturing in Chicago.

Throughout the evening appropriate musical selections were provided by Frank Panacci and Gina Avola. We later learned that at one time Frank actually worked for the Colombo Company. Now there's an interesting piece of BAAC accordion trivia!

It would serve no purpose to mention all of the many speakers who stepped forward to recognize and pay tribute to Gordon and Gloria, but it was very easy to identify the common thread in all of the comments. A gentleman.... always available to help.... did whatever it took to solve a customer's problem (including sending the accordion to a competitor!).... stood behind everything he did or sold... made a great accordion! It was obvious that the quality of the man was equal to and as important as the quality of the accordion.

Gordon was presented with several plaques and a banner which we all signed (made up by Glenn McClelland.) Gor-


and Sons Company which operated con- don and Gloria were thankful for the attention and honor, and Gordon stressed that he was only retiring - not leaving the area. He assured us all that he fully intended to remain in contact with all of his many friends in the accordion community. And we intend to hold him to that promise!

Accordions on the Superhighway

For those of you into computers...are you familiar with the Internet computer network? Internet connects schools, large companies, military, and individuals through telephone lines, but using digital information instead of a voice. The Internet is in most countries, and has over 20 million people tied to it.

I have Internet access through my company. It turns out that there are thousands of special interest groups on the "Net." Marian Kelly introduced me to one group devoted to the accordion. Joining is simply a matter of sending a Net note to the group indicating that you wish to join. Once on the membership list, you will be able to send and receive messages from the other 350+ members of the accordion group throughout the world. (Editor's note: we found Pam Bishop, who will be our guest and will play for us at our December meeting, through the Net. We read her message that she would be visiting Berkeley from her place of work in England and asking whether there were persons interested in the accordion in the Bay Area; we began a dialog with her as if she lived in the next town!) You will have the choice of either sending a message to an individual or sending it to a group of individuals, such as the accordion group, since both individuals and groups have their own distincitive "Net address".

In the short time I have been on the Net, I have made contact with a person at the University of Dundee in Scotland, a physicist in Germany, several people from Scandinavia, and many from the British Isles in addition to people from across the US and Canada. While this group tends to be populated by people with a preference for concertinas, melodeons and button boxes, there are many who are piano accordion players and even several who are MIDI accordionists.

The Net is a fine way to research


