

Following is some **bio info on Mike Corino**, excerpted from "The History of Piedmont Emigration: Great Piedmontese Men Around the World."



Mike Corino

Michele Corino is a Piedmontese emigrant who became one of the most famous accordionists and light music conductors of Piedmont (Italy); now he is even the most famous of America. He attended primary school in the town of Castino. One day one of his sisters brought an accordion from San Francisco to Michele in Italy. Michele showed a natural bent for playing. He went on to study music and accordion. He captured the attention of Maestro Angelini, who recruited him for his orchestra, at that time one of the most famous in Turin. From there Michele made friends with Maestro Pavesio and Maestro Carlo Prati, composer of "Ciau Turin." The group, "Cetra," cut a series of disks. They created the orchestra "Gai Campagnoli" for Italian radio and television. These recordings spread throughout the world including America. When Michele went to San Francisco to visit his sister in 1947, the Italians there persuaded him to stay. There he met his bride Gloria, daughter of two Italians, and settled down. In San Francisco Michele became a conductor, and founded the Corino School of Music. He has participated in many, many official events and received many honors. Lawrence Mania, honorary

president of "Piedmontese People Around the World" in North Carolina, underlined how much Michele Corino contributed to the spread and enhancement of the great Italian and Piedmontese light music tradition, while keeping a remarkable typical element of Italian popular culture alive among emigrants. Michele was among five people awarded the international "Piedmontese People Around the World" prize at the Conference of the same name, which was held in November 1999. The prize is restricted to "those emigrants who honored their native country."

The October meeting will also include our **annual honoring of board members and others who have put forth great effort to benefit the club,** along with our annual **party with extra-nice refreshments!** We'll hope to see you there!

# A Tribute to Maestro Anthony Galla-Rini By Rino Pucci

Way back in the early thirties, when I was age nine, my mother took me to my first accordion lesson. The studio was an impressive Victorian located on Van Ness Avenue in San Francisco. According to my uncle, Guido Simonini, a new accordion teacher

had arrived in San Francsico from New York. His name was Anthony Galla-Rini.

The first lesson and the many to come were devoted to learning to read musical notes. My first accordion was an 80-bass Cellini accordion, pink in color and Italian in origin.



I remained with Maestro

Galla-Rini until he left to go East for higher achievements. He was then to be involved with the Detroit Symphony.

The years of study with Mr. Galla-Rini were the fulfillment of quite a repertoire beginning with "Neapolitan Nights," "Il Sirio," "Ho Detto Al Sole," and a college medley including Stanford, St. Mary's, and California. Early standards were: "Rose Room," "Santa Lucia," "Song of the Islands," "Alice Blue Gown," "Sharpshooters March," "The Old Spinning Wheel," "Tango Delle Rose," "Lonely Lane," "Hand Me Down My Walking Cane," "Golden Slippers," "Under the Double Eagle," "Mexicali Rose," "Nola," "Over the Clouds" (by Galla-Rini), "La Sorella," "Estudiantina," "Hungarian Dance No. 5" — to mention just a few! Most of these selections are included in my playing engagements to this day.

In conclusion, I would like to suggest to the new and upcoming accordionist to learn, to perfect, to memorize good musical selections, and in the long run you'll never have to worry about what to play when you are called on to do so.

Many thanks to Maestro Galla-Rini who not only taught me my first lesson in music and accordion playing, but also for his life-long contribution to the accordionists of our generation and of those to come. Thank you, Maestro Galla-Rini.



#### Your Executive Board met ...

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# Accordionist Accompanies Famous Mormon Tabernacle Choir Edited from article submitted by Jay M. Todd of Salt Lake City

The Salt Lake City, Utah accordion community is still abuzz about the positive impact for the accordion worldwide, due to the September visit of nineteen-year-old Vietnamese classical accordionist Ms. Nguyen Trang (we would say Trang Nguyen), and her accompanying the world-renowned Mormon Tabernacle Choir with her accordion during the Choir's weekly "Music and the Spoken Word" program, broadcast by over two thousand radio and TV stations and shortwave worldwide.

Winner of the internationally prestigious Hong Kong Competition for Young Asian Musicians and its \$20,000 first prize, Ms. Nguyen won over three other finalists: a soprano, a violinist, and a cellist—and was thus assured a professional engagement contract for a year to help launch a career. Chief adjudicator of the competition (of over 300 entries from over 20 countries) was Sir Neville Marriner, founder of the Academy of St. Martin-in-the-Fields. Ms. Nguyen's solo U.S. engagement was to perform a concert at the Assembly Hall on Temple Square in Salt Lake City on Saturday, Sept. 7, and then perform a solo and accompany the Mormon Tabernacle Choir during their half-hour program.

At her Saturday evening concert, Ms. Nguyen impressed an audience of 900 with her stellar performance of eleven difficult classical pieces.

Sunday morning at the Mormon Tabernacle on the half-hour program, and in front of the usual 5,000 international and national tourists, she played an abbreviated "Scene de Bal" by Hellmesberger (due to time constrictions), and then accompanied the Choir as they sang "Sweet and Low" (music by Barnby, words by Tennyson).

Ms. Nguyen was accompanied on this trip by her accordion professor Mr. Luu Quang Minh (we would say Minh Luu), who is also the deputy director of the Hanoi National Conservatory of Music. They were hosted for six days in Salt Lake City by Jay and Janet Todd of the Temple Square Concert Series Committee. They immediately struck a bond with Janet Todd, herself one of America's former accordion champions who previously toured the world and southeast Asia on a five-month tour under U.S. State Department auspices and is well known regionally for her accordion performances.

While in Salt Lake City, the Vietnamese guests also met with Paul Pasquali, creator of the Concerto digital accordion, which wowed Mr. Luu, who is a promoter of jazz studies at the Hanoi Conservatory. Mr. Pasquali, as many of you know, is also the founder of the very popular annual Las Vegas International Accordion Convention. With these and others of the local accordion community encouraging them, the visitors indicated through interpreters their pride in seeing others who knew the accordion intimately.

But wait-there more! Before coming to the US.,

Trang and her professor communicated that they would like to know if there were universities in the U.S. that would accept the accordion as an instrument of study. So, following their Salt Lake City visit they flew to Detroit, for Jay Todd had arranged for them to meet with Peter Soave, world renowned accordionist and a teacher at Wayne State University. Peter and his wife Mady, herself a very gifted accordionist, hosted Ms. Nguyen and Mr. Luu for four days. Ms. Trang gave a mini recital before a panel of the music faculty at Wayne State University—and was unanimously awarded a four-year full tuition scholarship, pending a language proficiency test, and other normal requirements.


Maybe it's time to dream about the famous Mormon Tabernacle Organ becoming—the Mormon Tabernacle Accordion!


# Free-to-Members Workshop

Camp included BAAC members Chris and Tor Arild, Mary Ann Field, Val Kieser and brand new BAAC member Michele Boddicker Scheffler as students and, of course, Joe Smiell and Joseph and Sally Ann Smiell who put on the camp. Others came from other parts of California and the country. The kitchen crew was headed up by Glenda Cissney, who provided outstanding food and cuisine.

For each camp, Joe gets a "feel" for the group and then writes music expressly for that group. As he does with the ensembles, Joe stresses *phrasing, articulation and dynamics* so that, as we learn the notes, we also learn the play them musically (i.e. horizontally rather than vertically). This year's beginning students made tremendous progress and were even playing ensemble style, conducted by Joseph Smiell, and they did a tremendous job!

Michele Scheffler, as noted earlier in the article about the BAAC September meeting, surely set a new record in speed of learning button box. It was relatively simple for her to understand the general layout of the buttons because of her extensive musical background.

Camp wasn't all work! 10-month-old Franz Joseph Smiell kept us in stitches with his antics. He holds the record for crawling the lenth of Heidelmann Lodge, and gets around very well on two feet while holding onto something preferably someone's pant leg—and reaches



for a button box whenever Joe gets some help at camp he has a chance. He even "helped" Joe give a button box class.

Wednesday afternoon is R&R time when everyone takes off for half a day. Some go hiking, some go to Reno, some (as Michele and Val did) drive around locally and visit places of interest, such as Donner Museum and Squaw Valley.
