DIRECT from ITALY

Vincenzo Abbracciante . . .

was born in Ostuni (BR), Italy in 1983 and is the third-generation of a family of accordionists. From an early age, he studied music, with his father being his first accordion teacher. He has since studied or attended master classes with some of the most noted jazz performers and composers from around the world—such as Franco D'Andrea, Bruno Tommaso and Steve Potts. As a classical accordionist, in 2000, he won the **25th International Accordion Championship** in Castelfidardo, Italy and in 2003, the **53rd Trophée Mondial**.

Vincenzo performs traditional accordion music with great dexterity and flair, he has composed sound tracks for film, appeared on film and now has flown to another level of accordion playing. He is one of those young players that will change the face of accordion for years to come.

Vincenzo will present a program featuring traditional virtuoso accordion solos and ensemble performance in a Jazz trio with drums and bass.



The Path to Better Sight Reading

Reprinted from the February 2004 Accordion Talk Newsletter of the Rose City Accordion Club

Sight-reading music is a reflex activity that one can develop and improve. Reading new music must be approached with proper discipline. If a student is fairly challenged by sight-reading—playing each new piece in fits and starts, fingers cautiously crawling to the next chord, head incessantly bobbing up and down from printed page to keyboard and back again – it can be a very frustrating, discouraging and time-consuming experience. One must keep in mind, however, that even some very accomplished musicians do this, and that there is hope for you and for them. A totally disciplined approach must be adopted—one that specifically trains reflexes. Not interpretation. Not technique. Reflexes. If the approach isn't taken, learning new pieces will always be a chore.

Three essential elements for a sight-reading improvement regimen: The student starts a sight-reading improvement campaign with folios of simple pieces: baby pieces perhaps, or easy classics in large volumes. Easy Bach, easy Mozart, easy pop books. Get out those method books from the old days. Don't be embarrassed to go back to Your First Music Book if need be. Choose the simplest things. Check to see if your local library has such music folios.

The second element is a good metronome. This is the instrument that inflicts the deadline upon your next digital move. It doesn't stop while you find your next note, so setting it at the slowest tempo where you think you can negotiate a passage is key. A simple piece might have one or two passages that are slightly more difficult than the rest of the piece (just as in any other piece of music). Those are the passages that should dictate your metronome's tempo for the entire piece. Once you have found that tempo, write it lightly in pencil (the third element, a pencil) at the top of the piece. Later, after you have gone through a series of pieces and your reading is improving, go back and review pieces at a faster tempo than the one you penciled in. Pencil that new tempo in too, for future reference. As you improve you'll get all your pieces up to speed by going back and increasing the metronomic beat, bit by bit.



2011 LAS VEGAS INTERNATIONAL ACCORDION CONVENTION Oct. 31 — Nov. 3


