From our Vice-President, Lynn!

The Las Vegas Accordion Convention, 2009

I had the pleasure of attending the 10th annual Las Vegas Accordion Convention this year, along with club members Gwyn Lister, Jim Holliday, and Evelyn Baulch. The convention was better than ever, the rooms inexpensive and the food quite good.

The format of the convention is straightforward. There are 1 hour classes taught by quest artists every day at 9, 10 & 11 AM, and then a banquet lunch with entertainment, followed by a 1 hour concert from 1-2 PM. Then classes at 2, 3 & 4 PM. dinner at 7 PM with music provided by the artists, then a 2 hour concert from 8-10 featuring 2 or 3 more of the artists. After hours, there is an "open mike" sponsored by Club Concerto. In between one can drop by the sales room with accordions, music, and CD's. There was also an orchestra, conducted by Joan Cochran Sommers.

that rehearsed from 3-5 in the afternoons. There are plenty of activities to keep anyone busy!

I would like to highlight just a few of the activities Lattended there were 3 classes going on in every time slot, so you had tough choices to make. Our own Ron Borelli gave wonderful classes on improvising and on blues scales, but the most absorbing one for me was Ron's talk on playing the accordion with the 3 Tenors and other professional orchestras and gigs he has been involved in. He showed how the music is written, and how often a part composed for accordion has been written by someone who has no idea how the accordion is set up. Ron is so well organized, well prepared and articulate that his workshops are a real education!

Workshops were also given by Gordon Kohl, Mary Tokarski, Mario Tacca, Mario Pedone, Sylvia Marie Barber, Stas Venglevski and Peter & Mady Soave. The other big surprise for me was a workshop I attended by a young Cana-

dian accordionist, 16 year old Michael Bridge. Michael gave two wonderful workshops, one on composing and recording your own music, and one on jamming and improvising. Both of these workshops were terrific, and really focused on the essentials that are needed for these activities. Gina Branelli, an international adjudicator, teacher, and dealer from the UK gave a workshop on accordion techniques that was an eye opener for me. She really changed the way I was holding the accordion, and it is a revelation. I'll be writing something about that in the future.

Concerts were given by Dick Contino, Art Van Damme, Peter & Mady Soave and Stas Venglevski. I very much enjoyed all of them. Dick has a new CD and has really changed his presentation. Both he and Art gave question and answer sessions, and I was able to attend Art's session. Art will be 90 next year, and Dick will be 80! They are both an inspiration. Sylvia Marie Barber is an entertainer extraordinaire funny, practical, and obvi-

ously has a ball doing what she is doing. If you' have never seen her, make it a point when you get a chance. Mady & Peter Soave and Stas Venglevski totally wowed the audience with their performances, and we also had great concerts by Mary Tokarski, Michael Bridge, Mario Tacca & his wife, singer Mary Mancini, and Dick Contino's son, Pete Contino and his band.

My final word is on the orchestra - what a wonderful experience. We had terrific music to play, including Galla-Rini's arrangement of Swan Lake, Tango Sentimental (which Absolut Accord played for the club just last month), Radetzsky March, Hands across the Sea, Lawrence of Arabia (based on a Palmer Hughes arrangement) and my absolute favorite, *Phantom of* the Opera/Music of the Night, partly arranged by Joan Cochran Sommers. The convention will be held in early November next year and I recommend it highly!

I had one of my best vacations ever at the recent Las Vegas Accordion Convention, October 19-23! In June, I received a postcard, and after a couple of emails and a call to Paul Pasquali, the organizer, I signed up for the full convention, and brought a friend who wanted to attend just the dinners and evening concerts.

For years my friend had been touting the artistic side of Las Vegas, and now since the accordion, my most recent obsession, was involved, I decided to take her up on it. We are both visual artists, and wanted to see some of the "town" as well as do some shopping. I am a total beginner on the accordion and am also learning to read music. However, I do like adventure, and

wanted to see and hear all of the artists that were slated to perform and give workshops.

This instrument has done something to my psyche and I am in love with the sounds and music it is capable of making. I certainly wasn't let down, as there were workshops where even beginners could glean some knowledge and information.

The music was superb, during meals and after dinner, and then into the late hours of the evening at an open floor venue where anyone could play if they wanted to. There was a store open each day during certain hours after lunch and dinner, where most of the musicians/workshop teachers had CDs and or music for sale. There was also quite a large selection of all kinds of accordions, acoustic and electronic, straps and other accessories, shirts, and lots of music books.

The hotel was nice, rooms comfortable and the food (2 meals daily) was very good, and even healthy.

Next year the convention starts on November 1 to avoid gigs some of you might have around Oktoberfest. I have already registered and booked a room, one day early, so I will have to bring my Halloween costume as well!

As well as hearing and seeing great musicians play every day, I also met new friends who share the same love and passion for our favorite instrument, the accordion.



Frank announced that an SFAC Scholarship has been proudly awarded to Sharon Greyhosky's student Mayumi Miyaoka.

The MC for the musical part of the afternoon was Gus Greyhosky. Gus welcomed Bob Berta to the stage. Borrowing Val's Pigini accordion, Bob played the Sicilian Tarantella Fiscchietando, The Lost Chord which he dedicated to Val, and Luci e Ombre. instrument or another but none so far plays the accordion except for Bob.



The pieces they played were: Wedding March, traditional, from 18th century Austrian Peasant Dances; Les Petits Moulins à Vent ("The Little Windmills,") by François Couperin, 1720; Non Ti Scordar Di Me, Ernesto de Curtis, 1935; Rondo a la Turca, by Mozart, 1778; Waltz of the Flowers from Nutcracker by Tchaikovsky, 1892; a wonderful medley from West Side Story, by Leonard Bernstein 1956-57, beautifully arranged by Richard himself; then, after Intermission

Friend and fellow accordionist Harry Gay passed away at his home in Stockton on October 29th of complications from pancreatic cancer. Harry was 73.

Harry moved from Washington D.C. to Stockton with his Swiss-immigrant parents at the end of World War II. He started to learn the accordion at the age of 10, from John Pisacco in Stockton. By the age of 14, Harry was a member of the local Musicians Union and had his own trio, a quartet and a 6 piece ethnic I talian band, in addition to playing solo in clubs and at private parties. At 18 Harry put down the accordion for a dentist's drill and practiced dentistry for 41 years, retiring in 2001. After a 22 year "pause", Harry picked the accordion back up, vowing only to play it for fun, but determined to pick up where he had left off— practicing 4 hours every evening.

Harry was an active member and contributor to many Bay Area accordion clubs—the Good Time Accordion Club in Escalon, Accordion Club of the Redwoods in Petaluma, the Golden State Accordion Club in Sacramento and our own San Francisco Accordion Club.

Harry will be greatly missed and remembered for his unending kindness and caring, sense of humor, words of wisdom and encouragement, very generous heart and unconditional love. We extend our deepest sympathy and support to Harry's loving wife of 53 years, Vivian, and to all his family and friends.
